History of FCCA's Historic SilverSmith House

The SilverSmith House was built in 1785 by John Brownlow and purchased soon after by James Brown, silversmith and father of six. The house represents a transitional period in Fredericksburg's history as it was built near the end of an era when high roof ridge peaks were the norm and half-timbered structures were common. The home typifies a middle-class tradesman's habitat in colonial times and offers testimony to the political transition that the Revolutionary War brought to Virginia.

During both Civil War battles for Fredericksburg, the house served as a forward hospital for Union forces. Wounded were brought to the building for immediate medical treatment before being moved to larger hospitals in nearby Stafford for long-term care. The house was undamaged during either battle.

Saved from demolition in the early 1960's by FCCA, the historic building has been home the art center ever since.
